Community Survey - *Spring 2023*

Following is our detailed analysis of the responses to the Trillium Awakening Community Survey.

The goals of the survey were to engage community members to provide bottom-up future direction, help TATC better understand and serve the community, and solicit ideas how to co-cr eate a thriving community.

The survey was sent in three separate emails to 576 recipients on the Trillium Awakening mailing list. On average, there were 280 recipients who opened the email (48.7% open rate), and there were 47 unique clicks (8.2% click rate). In total, 80 community members completed the survey.

The highlights from these survey results were shared in brief presentations during the community meetings on June 2nd. The survey responses were generally very positive and reminded us of how much members of the community value this community. At the same time, several possible growing edges or challenges were named. It is our hope that sharing this information with the TA community will help us to think collectively about the state of this community, our shared values, and our hopes for the future growth of the community.

Question 1: Which of the follow indicates your role in the Trillium Awakening community?

Question 2: What country and state/province are you from?

The survey respondents primarily come from the United States, Australia, and Canada, with a few participants from other countries. Geographically, there is a widespread distribution across different states, provinces, and regions. The largest TA local communities currently are Olympia, Fairfield, and New Jersey/New York/Pennsylvania. A number of respondents were from California, but they appear to be spread over a broad geographical area rather than a concentrated community. The international presence highlights the global reach and interest in Trillium Awakening beyond national boundaries. The locations of 9 respondents are unknown.

Question 3: Do you have a local community with which to meet?

80 responses

Yes: 36 (45%)

No: 44 (55%)

Question 4: Why are you participating in Trillium Awakening?

Responses were broken into these top categories:

1. Awakening, deepening, spiritual development, growth, evolution (34)
2. Community, connection, companions, family, home (29)
3. Teachings (9)
4. Diversity and quality of teachers (8)
5. Like-minded, lovely people (8)

These responses highlight the key aspects that individuals find valuable in this community. The focus on awakening and personal growth is complemented by the sense of connection and belonging to a supportive community. These aspects are both central to the community members' experiences. For some, it may be a surprise how important community is to our members. However, it should also be stated that the 80 community members who completed this survey may be more interested in community than those who did not complete the survey. There's just no way to know how representative this sample is of the whole community.

Additionally, the presence of valued teachings and the diversity of teachers, the distinguishing TA culture and being with like-minded people, the emphasis on mutuality, support, acceptance, embodiment, transmission, events, service, and the opportunity for shared learning and helping others awaken all contribute to the overall appeal of this community.

Question 7: What does community mean to you?

Sample full responses:

“Ideally, an extended chosen family of like-minded and like-hearted souls in divinely human incarnations, mutually recognizing and reflecting the Source-divinity of one another, enjoying each other in cooperative relationship and true friendship, and putting our hearts together and co-creatively working/playing together to make a positive difference in the world--we help tip it back into loving balance.”

“Connecting with like minded souls, who's spiritual journey creates a shared experience. connecting from the heart, vulnerability and deep openness. Trust, trust developed over time creates a heart bond of love and connection I cannot find anywhere else.”

“Community is the activating force to manifest love and awareness in the world. By enlivening community we're directly incarnating awareness and increasing the likelihood of new and unpredictable manifestations of connectedness and light. What we're here for.”

“To me community means warm sharing of a common interest and compatible values. It means developing mutually shared care and trust for each other. I have your back and you have mine. It means having activities that we can share in, and we can share responsibilities for co-creating and maintaining activities and structures that would enable the community to thrive. There is a lot of engagement, and everyone (teachers, mentors, and participants) contributes in time/energy and possibly also financially to ensure that the community thrives.”

“Without community, awakening fades into the background”

The responses highlight the importance of support, shared values and ideals, shared experiences and explorations on the spiritual journey, fostering each other's growth and development, as well as sharing in our lives in a tangible way. Also important are connection and authenticity within a safe container, friendship and love, and diversity of thought and tolerance of differences. Respondents value the sense of belonging and growth that come from being part of a community that aligns with their values and aspirations.

Question 8: What kind of community atmosphere are you looking for?

Responses were broken into the following categories:

1. Welcoming, friendly, accepting, open (19)
2. Shared holding, loving, caring, kindness, empathy (14)
3. Mutual embrace and respect for differences/uniqueeness, nonjudgmental, inclusion, valuing all (11)

Sample full responses:

“A deep sense of heart-interconnectedness, sharing kindness and love with one another, collective cooperation and teamwork, respecting and honoring each others human and divine beauty, and recognizing the deep souls that we each are. We revel in satisfaction and fulfillment through synergistic working together in contributing to a happier and healed world and celebrating life together.”

“Authentic, vulnerable, wise, courageous, considerate, passionate participation from each and all.”

“A friendly, welcoming, fun, silly, serious, respectful, challenging Growth Medium.”

“Share living, contribution, friendly, trusting, a community where people share common experience while still being able to express their individuality.”

The responses to question 8 highlight the desire for a community that offers shared holding, loving, caring, kindness, and empathy. There’s a desire for a community that is accepting, open, nonjudgmental, that fosters respect of differences and uniqueness and values diversity. There’s also a desire for a community that supports spiritual growth, encourages authentic expression, and fosters deep connections. Participants value an environment that is engaging, nurturing, and safe, where individuals can explore and celebrate together while feeling seen, heard, and valued.

Question 9: Additional Comments

The comments reflect a range of experiences and perspectives within the Trillium community. While the majority express appreciation and love for the community and its teachings, others raise concerns or share their dissatisfaction with certain aspects of Trillium Awakening. Some respondents mention having limited or no involvement in Trillium activities, indicating that their current engagement is minimal.

Most comments were positive, such as these:

“We can all learn from each other no matter that we may be in different stages of the awakening process.”

“I appreciate the diversity of teachers and the freedom for them to express viewpoints/disciplines aligned but not necessarily solely based on Trillium dogma. I also appreciate the current evolution to

include more emphasis (if not primacy) of the heart, the soul and love in addition to (somewhat dry/flat) discussions on consciousness.”

“Let's nurture collective synergy. We have profound soul-full-ness and so many riches and in the entire Trillium community that are waiting to be harvested and shared with the world. Then more people in the world will want to join and participate with our happy extended family, which will be making a difference in the world and helping humanity evolve in love.”

“While in person events will likely grow in the post-pandemic period, I think the online events should also continue to be cultivated, partly as a means of emphasizing TA as an international movement.”

However, there were a few that were challenging us to improve.

“I don't believe Trillium is a community at all. I think for the Teachers and Mentors it may be a community. Its clear to me that Trillium is created by the Teachers and for the Teachers and Mentors, not for Participants. “Participants” are more like units of exchange for the Teacher's income. Most events, even the “free” ones, require being enrolled with a Teacher. It's like going to a church and being forced to pay the Minister for counseling in order to participate with the church community.”

“At this time, Trillium Awakening feels like separate groups. the teachers are separated from the students and mentors. The mentors from the students/participants. There is a rigidity to the range of teaching and there is no formal practices to deepen individual development. Nothing seems to happen after the Whole Being Realization.”

Possible Next Steps

Top Next Steps

1. Support co-creation and community by expanding the TA Community Building Working Group
2. As teachers, consider a wider range of TA events including
 - a. More in-person local events
 - b. More variety of online offerings
 - c. Offerings that lead to a deeper experience
3. As teachers and local community leaders, build more local communities
4. As community members, promote local TA communities and service to the broader communities
5. As web and emails teams, address logistical suggestions
